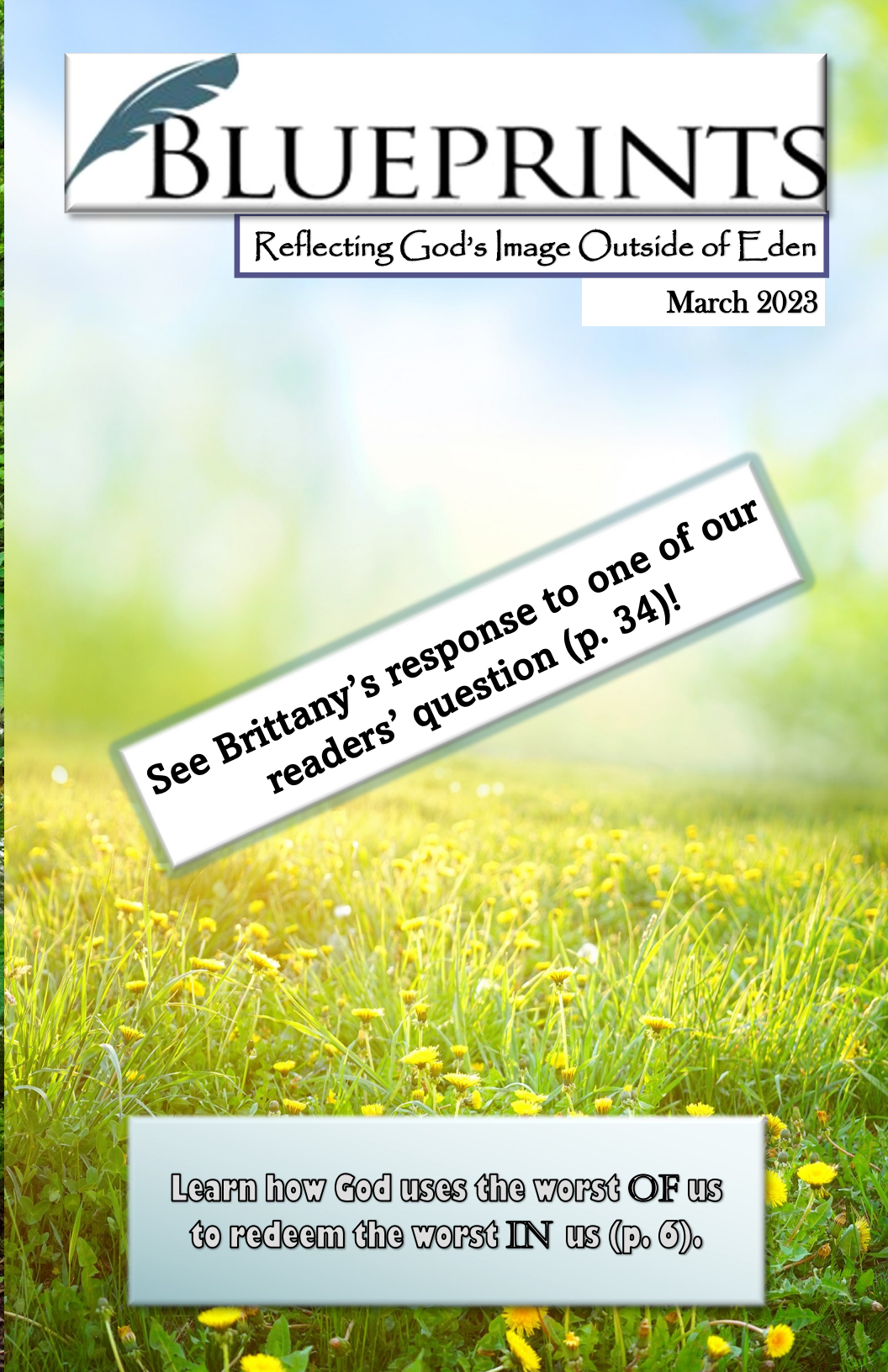

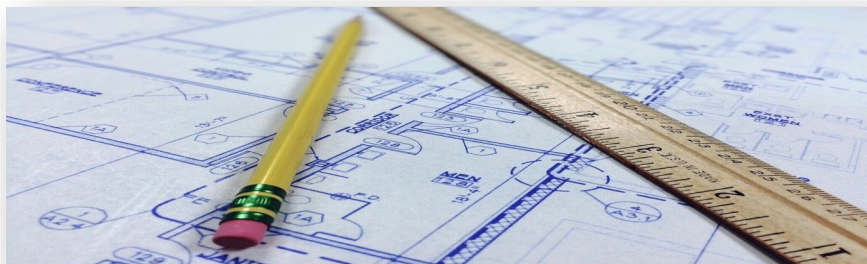

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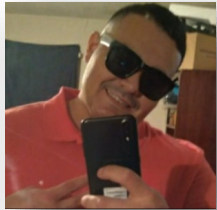

And that's why I enjoy this time of the year.

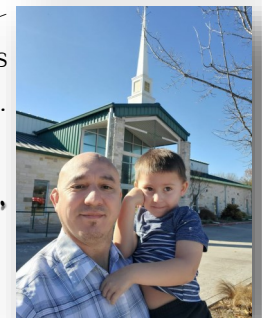

We are conditioned from childhood to pledge allegiance to a flag whose very symbol idolizes the personal quest for human fulfillment.

Now, to be clear, there is nothing wrong with any of those things if kept within the proper framework. God doesn't have a problem with us seeking a better life, but He does have a problem when that becomes the end all of everything we do. In short, we are not to preoccupy ourselves with mere pleasure seeking or financial security, because those things can easily distract us from the true calling of our faith.

We are here to advance His kingdom not ours.

Which takes us back to mistaking how God gets His word out. We might think He needs for us to get some political might on our side or to build as many platforms as we can or train leaders or develop curriculums or conduct workshops and seminars.

We think He needs our ingenuity.

A careful study of the Word, however, reveals that He *never* used human skill to establish His covenants, nor did He require

For example: It isn't what we have done in our past that stops us from being closer with Him. It is, however, because we have not asked forgiveness of those sins. We try to be close with our Father without saying, "Father, I did wrong. I hurt people I love—including You—and I need to be delivered and set free."

Brother Cantu's question: I become depressed and get anxiety a lot and feel helpless in my situation. I pray but like I feel God's not answering my prayers. What advice can you give me?

Brother Cantu,

Thank you for writing our team. We appreciate your feedback. Hearing from our subscribers also lets us know that the messages are getting to the exact people God put on our hearts to write.

I just wanted to tell you I know exactly what you mean when it feels like the depressed cloud just won't go away. It took many years of trusting God, but one day it clicked: *If everything God does is in seasons and this one doesn't seem to leave, it must be something I am doing or not doing that is allowing and inviting the dark cloud to stay over me.*

There are many religions that speak of love and peace to the world, Brother Cantu. But what is so uniquely divine and omniscient about our God and our relationship with our Maker is that He doesn't just do things *for* us. He says He dwells *with* us, too (cf. Is. 57:15)! And He will not dwell in an unclean space. This

man's power to advance His redemptive plan. It doesn't matter how neatly we decorate our fragile frame; it cannot contribute to God's glorious plan for humanity. Instead of asking clay pots to fancy up themselves for His plan, He demands they remain broken and lowly.

Consider these facts, for example:

- God clothed Adam and Eve. (Translation: They couldn't clothe themselves good enough for God.)
- God used an elderly couple to establish a nation. (Translation: They weren't physiologically capable.)
- God called Moses while he was fugitive. (Translation: As a murderer, Moses wasn't "qualified" to do anything but serve time for his crime.)
- God anointed a teenage shepherd boy to be king. (Translation: David wasn't among the prestigious of his family.)
- God used depressed and "emotionally unstable" men to rebuke kings and nations. (Translation: They weren't financially or socially sound.)

And the list can go on and on, which would also include how God used pagan rulers and religious maniacs to advance His kingdom.

- He raised up a pharaoh to serve His purpose (Ex. 9:16).
- He raised up the Chaldeans to punish His people (Hab. 1:6).
- He used Rome to execute His Son (Matt. 27).
- He used religious leaders to persecute the Church and turned one the best of them (Saul of Tarsus) into the writer of  $\frac{3}{4}$  of the New Testament, mostly while he was locked up!

And during the first 300 years after Christ's life, the

Church had experienced a radical persecution that did more to advance God's kingdom than anything we could ever do with our fancy buildings and power point presentations. The point couldn't be clearer:

*God uses the worst of humanity to accomplish His plan.*

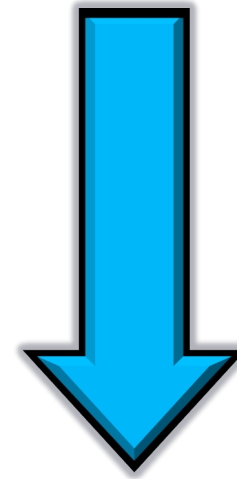
This is fantastic news to those who are broken and beat down. It is just what the cast aways need to hear; namely, that they don't need to pretty themselves up to be accepted and used by God. To the uneducated God says, "I want you especially because you aren't blinded by your degrees."

But for those who are steeped in political influence and are loaded with cash and well connected to those in power, this is bad news. For us who are adorned with earthly power, we may be able to build an army of humanitarian forces and curry favor with powerful elites, but we are doing it on our strength and by our own power. To be clear, God can certainly promote us to lofty positions and we can work hard to acquire material gain, but none of that is a prerequisite for His power to be made known. The Lord has made it clear that He will build His kingdom "not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit" (Zech. 4:6).

Why is all this important for us to understand?

It's simple: If we believe that God needs our money and power to establish His kingdom, then we will rely on our resources to do what we think He wants to do. We will sidestep discipleship and form cronies. We will skirt submission and erect monuments of personal glory. And when done, those accomplishments will not reflect the God of grace nor the power of His glory but will highlight our own.

Our names will be lifted, not His.

**Check yourself.**

Act like men, which is Paul’s basic point.

**Be strong.**

The expectation for a man is... that HE is the strong one.

**Let all you do be done in love.**

Not how society deems or defines love, but how Paul explains it, in 1 Corinthians 13:4-7: Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

This brings us full circle. Dear men, your goal in life is not you. Your goal in life is to love and serve Jesus, by also loving the people around you like Jesus. That is what it means to be a man, and that is the kind of selfless, consistent, Biblical, godly men that we need now more than ever! 🌟

But we can take great courage and have confidence in His plan because it doesn’t require a human skillset or some group talent. He wants our submission not our resume. He wants us to remain lowly and at His feet. So, instead of trying to ascend the mount of popularity we should remain in the valley of humility.

We should embrace our fragility and surrender it to God—lest we build *our* kingdom under the guise of His name. 🌟

moms and dads literally, and necessarily, are at their beck and call as babies exercise their “center of anyone’s world” visage. Woe betide the parent who neglect their every want, much more need. God makes them soooo cute... you can’t help but to love them! Helplessness can be only so an endearing quality in a needful babe who needs his mother incessantly for their entire existence, but I am sure you would agree that it is a singularly irritating quality in a man.

There are far too many men who live this way who, for whatever reason, skipped the maturation process, only by default subsequently slip into manhood with a male body, but a fetal mind, examples of being “big” for their age; the fellow, the dude, the guy—basically a boy/man hybrid—but not real men. To go from formula to beer, from temper tantrums to big boy problems, overall insisting that they be treated like a babe. That is not what real men do. Men grow up. And a pivotal part of growing up is learning how to shift the focus off of themselves and direct their attention to those around them. We do not live to serve ourselves. We live to serve others, like Jesus, who “...came not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.” (Mark 10:45). If the aforementioned brings something to your own remembrance...*repent*... and let’s continue.

### **Five Essential Qualities of Biblical Manhood**

Be watchful, stand firm in the faith, act like men, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love. (1 Cor. 16:13-14) Paul gives five ways that men can act like men! He says:

#### **Be on the alert.**

Take on the character of a church elder in all aspects and spheres of relationships, through spiritual protecting and defending all concerned. Those men who do not have this “alert” frame of mind is still stuck in that boy/man continuum and must humbly reconsider their spiritual manhood.

#### **Stand firm in the faith.**

Beyond human relationships, a man must have a life and relationship with the triune God worth imitating, even and especially in the immediate family.





There is an obvious dearth of masculinity in this post-modern world. No, not the cave man, flatus/gas eructing, beer swigging, crotch-grabbing, chest bumping cartoon characters of manhood that we've been inured with for the longest time, ad nauseum.

Any man can grow up to become a big-bodied phallic symbol. We have plenty of those. What I am talking about is men... REAL men...Biblical men! And we need them now, more than ever! We need another kind of "macho man", who bravely sounded the alarm nearly 200 years ago, against the coming plague of feminism, but where the world was more concerned with showing gutlessness with of the coming insidious emasculation..

After decades of manliness, the vast majority of men show that they haven't the foggiest of notions as to what Biblical masculinity looks like. For this reason, we need a revival of true masculinity. Many, if not most, of the problems plaguing this culture, and especially the church, have to do with failed masculinity, not to mention weak, impotent, even effeminate men.

So, we begin with 1 Corinthians 13:11 (ESV), where Paul gives us a primer about masculinity: When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I gave up childish ways. This verse really does present the entire case for Biblical manhood in two basic implications; "*grow*" and "*up!*"

But I wax in generalities. So, let get a little more specific, with the epitome of manifest, bone fide immaturity. In the home, the infant is the purest distillation of egocentrism on earth, as

Only God could heal that type of leprosy. Reality had set in, and I was introduced to some people who told me about themselves, God, and classes to help change the direction of their lives. But I didn't realize the seed that was planted began to grow roots in me. The seeds that were planted started working in my mind and began to shape the way I thought.

Your thoughts will follow your life, and my life with God began to take on a new meaning. I had one been a dry shrub in the desert and now being attached to the Vine, I am bearing good fruit.

So, you see this change in me would never have happened or been possible if I didn't surrender to Jesus. 📺



## Coming Back to Where You Started

One of the most humiliating experiences of my life happened when Emily and I moved back to the United States after living in South America.

We moved back into the same house and same job I had before our adventure. A friend of mine with a low emotional intelligence score even blurted out at one point, 'How embarrassing, you're right back where you started!' His statement irritated me because he basically said what I felt. It felt like a setback — the adventure was over, I had failed. Now I was returning like a dog with his tail between his legs, limping home.

That return home turned out to be short-lived, but it gave me firsthand experience with a pattern I've seen play out in lots of people's lives.

Sometimes we have to go back to a place we left, before we have our next adventure.

Psalm 23 says, "The Lord is my shepherd... he leads me in paths of righteousness." That Hebrew word for path (*magol*), actually means *paths made of circles*. I'm convinced the journey of life (and God's work) looks more like an ever-widening circle than a straight line.

I had the image below designed for my new book *Connecting the Dots*, because I wanted a visual representation of what the journey in each season of life tends to look like. There's a fairly predictable pattern of processes we go through in each season.

part is I'm able to share with and show people what Jesus has done in my life.

4. *How did you hear about the God's Design for Life class, why did you decide to enroll, and what did you get most from it?* I heard about the class through Ruben Constante, the founder of Blueprints for Living Ministries, Inc. I first found him while I was at my ID unit as I read and followed all his articles in *The Echo*, the Texas prison newspaper. He really inspired me and so when I met him here at the Kyle Correctional Center, I knew I had to be involved in anything he had going on. So, I signed up for the God's Design for Life class, and what I have gotten out of the class is hope, forgiveness, and love. Ruben's a walking-talking-living testimony of how God can use people like me because He's doing it through Mr. Constante.
5. *What is your main message to the men you serve?* That there is a better way, and it's through Jesus Christ. It's not easy, but it's for eternal life, so it's worth it. 🖼️







1. *What is your name and how much time have you served?*  
My name is Thomas “Quicks” Hinojosa. I’ve served nine years and nine months.
2. *What prompted you to repent and turn to the Lord?* I’ve tried my way and just doing what I believed to be right and kept getting the same results—which was returning to prison! This time around I was sent to the Darrington unit with a 15-year aggravated sentence and witnessed what God had done in other brothers that had life sentences and just a lot of time without parole. Jesus was shining through them. I wanted what they had. Then, a tragedy occurred; I had lost my father. Jesus had been my Savior but then it was time to make Him my Lord, and that was in 2017. It hasn’t been easy, but it has been worth it.
3. *How are you serving the Kyle Correctional Center community?* I am a Cognitive Facilitator. With this job I am able to teach Cognitive Intervention, but the best

Every season starts with a Turning Point – a situation that changes life (marriage, a baby, a betrayal, a medical diagnosis) then we face a series of opportunities that cause us to grow.

The last three stages in the circular process involve returning home – like Frodo going back to the shire after his adventure through Middle Earth. We come back home but we aren’t the same as when we left. We’ve lived some life and learned along the way. Hopefully, we’re a little more humble. We’ve got a message to share with folks who didn’t take our journey.

If you find yourself going back to a place you hoped (or vowed) to never return to — geographically, relationally,



emotionally, a job—can I encourage you with something?

I’m certain this phase of the journey isn’t a setback — it’s a set up. It’s part of the process of becoming all God intends you to be. If you can keep your perspective lifted this will be an important part of the journey that will ultimately bring meaning and purpose in your life.

*...being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus. (Philippians 1:6)*

If you want to know why there is so much confusion in your life or why it is so prevalent in our world (especially sexual confusion), then look no further than Scripture. We don't need pills or any type of mind-altering substance to grant us relief from confusion.

James said, "For where ENVY and SELF-SEEKING exist, confusion and every evil thing are there" (Jas. 3:16).

Confusion, then, is the direct result of ENVY and SELF-SEEKING lifestyles.

Confusion will always result when we want what someone else has and when we pursue only our self-interests.

Confusion is the product of looking for our own way.

Confusion is the result of pride.

Therefore, repent, and confusion will disappear.

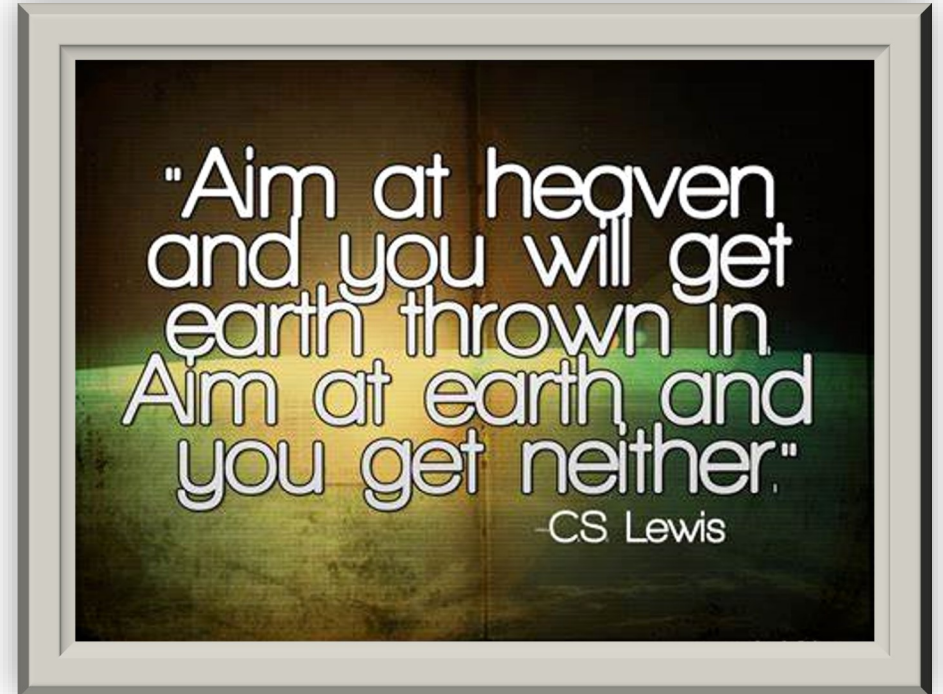

priests to "come on... come near... But I will be regarded as holy by those who come near me." In the New Testament, in Hebrews 10:19-20 we find similar instructions:

"... Therefore, brothers, since we have confidence to enter the holy places by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain, that is, through his flesh..." The curtain, which concealed the glory of God from human sight, was torn at Jesus' crucifixion. Now, the curtain, the veil, was now the flesh of Christ that hid His divine glory—that same glory that broke through on the Mount of Transfiguration that flesh couldn't contain. As Peter exclaimed, "...we were eyewitnesses to His majesty...for we were with Him on the holy mountain..." (2 Peter 1:16b, 18b); also, "...by a new and living way (that is, consecration), that he opened for us through the curtain, that is, through His flesh...let us draw near..." (Hebrews 10:20,22a).

Israel had priests to perform the duties of cleansing for the people (and themselves) before approaching the Tabernacle, and later the Temple. But now we have a High Priest who goes not only into the earthly Tabernacle, but who goes into the very presence of the Father in the heavenly Tabernacle, on our behalf, as our Mediator, our High Priest. "...let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with are hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water." (v 22).

The uneasy conscience brought on by sin invariably keeps us at a safe distance from Him. Adam and Eve, instead of embracing their Creator, instead experience the same disquietude as they made themselves scare when called by God, avoiding the nearness of Him.

# Five Essential Disciplines of the Faith: 3. Worship, part 2.

## Preparation

Remember, in Exodus 19:10-12 (ESV), within the awesome circumstances of giving the Law, where God said to Moses to call the people to prepare to come into His presence, or near His presence, but not onto the mountain itself, "...Go to the people and consecrate them today and tomorrow and let them wash their garments..." In worshipful effect, He said "I want those people, before they come near Me, to get ready to come near me, to prepare to come near Me."

God gave Israel two days to get ready for the third day, specifically, to ensure ritual purity by washing their clothes, abstaining from sex, and to particularly safeguard the holiness of the mountain (vv10-15). On the third day, in the midst of thunder and lightning, thick smoke, and a trumpet blast, Moses brought the trembling people to the foot of the mountain, as the LORD subsequently called Moses up to its summit. The LORD once again told Moses to reintegrate to the people, under penalty of death, not to become an out-of-control mob, as well as the priests to continue in consecration, still ever mindful the holiness of Mount Sinai, as He also called for Moses' brother Aaron up the mountain (vv16-25). These three momentous days preceded the coming down from Mount Sinai the Ten Commandments.

The trumpet sounded; the people trembled. Such overt solemnity is hardly in effect today, as we now perhaps nominally get ready, even to prepare, before we draw near Him on the Lord's Day. Many have forgotten how to tremble before Him, much more regard Him as being absolutely holy. In stark contrast, the trembling people, in verses 17-22, were in the midst of the veritable and terrible awesome, as God manifest himself upon Mount Sinai with smoke and earthquakes.

Over and over again God invites the people and the
